I. READING COMPREHENSION

THE TEXT

1. After working as a women's clothing designer for the British retailer Topshop for six years, Ms. Sweetman-Durney realized at 27 that she wasn't in love with it anymore. "It seemed crazy to opt out, but I wanted to create something that would last and extol Ireland's design history and craftsmanship," she said.

2. Starting her own business making jewelry wasn't as easy as a march down the lane to a nearby tree. Her big challenges were that she was young and a woman. Although she hadn't experienced discrimination before, as she was brought up in a tolerant family, she faced it after landing her contract with Topshop to design women's dresses in 2005. "I felt so upset and mad when I was refused a credit card with 500 euros of available credit, even though I had gone to several banks in town," Ms. Sweetman-Durney complained. What deepened her bitterness was that her husband Brian – a student at the time – was given a card with a credit line five times that amount.

3. And yet, despite all hardships, Ms. Sweetman-Durney, now 33, runs her own successful jewelry business, *Chupi*, which was started four years ago. *Chupi* is operating in 64 countries, has doubled sales annually for the last three years and has grown to a staff of 22. Moreover, the business is profitable and carries no debt. "It was a challenging endeavour when I started out. Few people believed that I could be not only creative at craftsmanship but also skilled at marketing. Much to their surprise, I was good at running a business as well," said the young entrepreneur.

4. Nowadays, an increasing number of women, like Ms. Sweetman-Durney, are starting businesses as a way to take control of their careers. In part, female entrepreneurship is on the rise because "women's advancement in workplaces has flatlined," said Ellen Galinsky, the founder of the Families and Work Institute. In a U.S.- based report, there are fewer companies providing paid family leave, and when you look at flexibility over all, these are shown to offer less part-time work than in previous reports." In 2016, the World Economic Forum declared that "parity between sexes will not be closed for another 170 years." Paradoxically, in 95 countries, women attend universities in equal or higher numbers than men.
