## I- READING COMPREHENSION (12 marks)

### THE TEXT

Steven P. Jobs died last Wednesday at the age of 56. He was the co-founder of Apple which led a cultural transformation in the world of music, movies and mobile communication. The death was announced by Apple, the company that Mr. Jobs and his high school friend Stephen Wozniak started in 1976 in a suburban California garage. A friend of the family said the cause was a pancreatic cancer.

Eight years after founding Apple, Mr. Jobs led the team that designed the Macintosh computer, a **break-through** in making personal computers easier to use. After a 12-year separation from the company, he returned in 1997 to oversee the creation of one innovative digital device after another – the iPod, the iPhone and the iPad. These transformed not only product categories like music players and mobile phones but also entire industries, like music and mobile communications.

Mr. Jobs was neither a hardware engineer nor a software programmer, nor did he think of himself as a manager. He considered himself a technology leader, choosing the best people possible, encouraging them and making the final call on product design.

In early 1976, he and Mr. Wozniak, using their own money, began Apple with an initial investment of \$ 1,300. Mr. Wozniak would be the technical half and Mr. Jobs the marketing half of the original Apple I computer. In April 1977, they introduced Apple II. It created a sensation and sales **skyrocketed**, from \$ 2 million in 1977 to \$ 600 million in 1981, the year the company went public.
