Obesity experts have been saying for years that children who sit in front of the TV screen day in and day out tend to be heavier. But now they are finding it's also the television ads children are watching, along with other factors, that can add inches their waistlines. A new policy statement from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) argues that junk food and fast food ads..... a child's desire to eat those types of foods. Studies also show that if kids stay up late at night playing video games, their lack of sleep can be a major factor in the risk of obesity and their drifting away from a healthy diet. "We've created the perfect conditions for childhood obesity: media, advertising and.....," said Dr. Victor Strasburger , a member of the AAP. "American society couldn't do a worse job at the moment: too TV, too many food ads and not enough exercise or sleep. Physicians and other health professionals can play a role by encouraging parents to control children's TV viewing, teach them about good and discuss the impact of food advertising," he added.
