THE TEXT

1. The day after Jack was expelled from school for fighting, he ended up on the streets of North London homeless and without the support he needed to get back on track. A brush with the police brought him to the attention of the council, which was able to find him a flat. At the council offices, he noticed a flier for the HITZ community programme, inviting teenagers to play rugby, but more than that, helping **them** gain qualifications and get into work. A year down the line, Jack is heading in an entirely different direction.

The HITZ programme does not just help disillusioned young people like Jack to play rugby, but also to find a secure footing in their lives, learn self-reliance and take steps towards education and employment. "It's the atmosphere I like," says Jack, now 18, who has completed his HITZ programme. I am a qualified rugby coach now, and I have Maths and English GCSEs."
3. Joel Stransky, who scored the winning points for South Africa in 1995 World Cup Final, was brought as a special guest to address the HITZ group. "In rugby, you learn to work as a team, to communicate and to be committed to common goals. You learn compassion for each other, the importance of understanding other points of view and the importance of tolerance, and these are all values to carry into life beyond the sports field," Stransky told the HITZ group.
4. "HITZ programme has definitely changed my outlook," admits Jack, who has applied to join the Army and hopes to become an engineer. "**It** has got me to concentrate on my future."
