1. It was almost midnight when I checked my email for the last time and turned off my phone for what I hoped would be forever. I had spent the summer of 2016 hand-building a straw bale home in County Galway, Ireland. The next morning, I intended to begin a new life without modern technology. There would be no running water, no clock, no electricity, no internet, no phone, no washing machine, or radio. I had no idea if unplugging myself would mean I'd lose all touch with reality – or finally discover it.

2. I'm reluctant to write much about the big-picture reasons why I decided to reject tech. We know them too well already. But, over time, I found my reasons slowly changed. Now, they have less to do with saving the world, and much more to do with savoring it. No longer glued to social media or the news, my world has become both smaller and more detailed. There are so many concrete things in front of me every day: fishing, planting trees, and a hundred other things modernity once did for me. Some suggest that this approach is selfish. Am I turning my back on global problems? Perhaps there's some truth to it. But I'm not sure a tweet about Brexit would help the world more than rolling my sleeves up and doing something that's useful here and now.

3. Not everything was easy at first, far from it. With no phone, there's no more calling family and friends. I now write letters to those I love. And instead of getting endless emails or calls, I receive one or two letters a day. Speaking of romance, after two years of living this way with my partner, we broke up. It would be too simplistic to put it all down to the lifestyle, though that certainly played a part. People ask if I get lonely, but I've been more sociable with my neighbors since giving up social media. I've also come to value quiet time with wildlife. I've lived with tech and without, and I know which of them brings me most peace and contentment. Now, I feel all the emotions and elements in their entirety, the rain, the joy, the wonder – all of it.

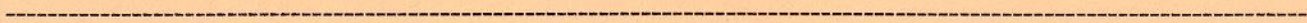

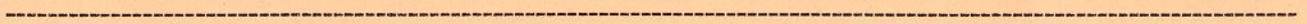

During the pandemic, the UK and other rich nations have relied on African doctors and nurses to support their health services. Now the continent's chief health leader is hoping to put the brain drain into with a plan to persuade African expatriates to return. Dr Nkengasong, the head of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC), said they were to attract scientists back from abroad. "We must in strengthening health systems," he added. "We need a very deliberate program that Africans to come back to the continent. A Nigerian in London doesn't just wake up in the morning and think, 'I'm going back to Nigeria.' That person needs lodging, and a job," Dr Nkengasong said. The Africa CDC will soon put forward a package of to govern the pandemic, which would include support for expatriates. Research by the House of Commons library last year showed that 2.5% of England's medical staff were African, Nigerians making up the largest proportion. Nigeria has about 72,000 registered doctors, but only 35,000 were practising in the country in 2021.
