1 - READING COMPREHENSION (12 marks)

- 1- For actress Sally Farmiloe, Bedgebury Girls' School seemed to be the perfect place for her teenage daughter Jade to grow and learn. But the £ 7,000 -a- term school turned out to be more of a low standards school than an elite academy for young ladies.
- 2- Two young pupils who hated the school so much were expelled for smashing some windows, while the bullying and tack of discipline were treated with an appalling tack of concern, according to Sally and other parents.
- 3- The actress said: "It was appalling. Jade was being bullied on the one hand and learning nothing on the other. No one was doing anything about it." The bullying started to get physical after Jade, 14, of West London, set up her own website, listing her achievements as a child actress and model. "But some of the older girls were very jealous, they printed out her picture and posted up "Wanted" posters all over the school. In the end, we decided that the website had to go," said Sally.
- 4- Even though the bullying stopped, by last summer Sally knew she had to take her daughter out of the school as she was so unhappy.
 - "There had been occasions where she was actually physically sick on the way back to school. She simply did not want to be <u>there</u>. The teachers and the administrative staff didn't seem to have much of a handle on what was going on in the school," added Sally.
- 5- "Academically, Jade had done very well at her Junior school but this did not last once she left. The teachers just drummed all the enthusiasm out of her. The whole place was just mayhem, with no one really taking control of the girls", said Sally.
- 6- A move last year to Bedales school in Hampshire thankfully gave Jade the help she needed. "The teachers are so much more helpful and you have a much closer relationship with them," said Jade.
- 7- Sally said: "It's not been a transformation but it will take time. The school really cares and Jade is now regaining the confidence she lost by the bullying over the three years at Bedgebury Girls' School."
