TEXT

- 1. Peter never dreamt he'd marry but last November, he and Lily tied the knot. Their story began in 1996. Lily, a 42-year-old woman from Los Angeles, was feeling bored and lonely. "I had few friends and felt I had nowhere to turn for support," says Lily. "I went on the Internet one day to see if I could meet some friends." Lily chatted to several people. But one man stood out. He was Peter Sinclair from Kent, England, and the pair began to chat regularly. Peter said he was in a wheelchair as he'd been born with an incurable condition which affects muscles and growth.
- 2. The pair stayed just friends for a while, but their relationship changed in March 2000 when Lily suffered a family bereavement. Grief-stricken, she poured out her heart to Peter. "He was patient and kind when I needed it most," she says. "Suddenly I felt closer to him than any other person in my life. I realized my feelings went beyond friendship." That July, Lily told Peter she loved him. He said he loved her, too—but he knew he'd have to tell her just how badly his condition affected his life. "It was very hard because I wasn't sure how she'd react," he says. "I was terrified she'd reject me."
- 3. Over e-mail, Peter said: "I can't walk or dress myself and I need help with eating. Worst of all, I could die at any time."
- "I knew he was in a wheelchair but I never realized how bad his condition was," says Lily. "I burst into tears."

In September the pair began speaking daily on the phone, then the following month Peter proposed. "Even though I'd never met Peter, I knew that I'd never connected with anyone like him before," says Lily.

"We shared so many interests." But marriage would mean moving to <u>Peter's country</u>. "Some people thought I was mad."

4. Lily and Peter married in November 2004 and they hope to move into a home of their own. "We're so happy together. The fact he's disabled is irrelevant," says Lily.

Peter has full-time carers, but Lily helps out. "She's amazing. For the first time in my life, I dare to think of the future," says Peter.
