"Instead of sitting around bored and getting into trouble, I've tried to show her other things to do."
- 3. They've come a long way since their first meeting in wintry London Park last November.Mary was wary," remembers Anna. "It's not surprising. I was a stranger, and she had just joined her foster family." And it wasn't only Mary finding her way; although Anna, who has no children of her own, was committed to mentoring, she was unsure what the programme would bring." I was positive about the difference it made, but even so, I worried. It meant giving up every Saturday for a year." But after a few tentative meetings, their Saturday afternoon slot became a date she looked forward to." I'm really glad I met Anna," says Mary.
- 4. But this November, when the year of mentoring is up, Anna and Mary will part company. It's policy that mentoring only lasts 12 months, before the child becomes attached or dependent." I'll miss Mary .I never realised I'd feel so proud of her now. I began the programme wanting to teach Mary new things. But seeing how positive she's become and how well she's adapted, I think it's been her teaching me, "says Anna.
