Women's experience with driving varies as illustrated in the following cases.

Case 1

Karen Vasiliou, 41, is from Worcestershire. She is married and runs a crafts business. "I have always loved driving. I passed my test at 17. In 1989, I took the Institute of Advanced Motorist driving course to improve my driving. The lessons make you more alert and teach you to notice things you would normally take for granted, such as road signs and how close people are to you. I have never had a car crash, not even a bump.

Driving makes me feel empowered and independent. I am good at reading maps and finding my way around. I am a much better driver than my husband. He drives too close to the car in front and does some hair-raising things that I'd never do. We don't argue about who is going to drive. We share it just as we share everything else."

Case 2

Frances Hughes, 38, is a housewife from Hertfordshire. "I passed my test when I was 18, but over the years, I've become more nervous about driving and now, I haven't driven for six years. I panic when I am behind the wheel. I've got terrible concentration and don't trust myself. I have decided I'm not a born driver. Even the idea of having to fill up the car with petrol on my own frightens <u>me</u>. My husband Nigel is the one who drives the children around. He says he doesn't mind, but I think he does. I do want to drive again because I feel I've lost my independence."

Case 3

Julia Goucem, 38, is a housewife from Brighton. "I learnt to drive at seventeen and drove for about 15 years. Five years ago, I sold my car as we needed money and I never bought another <u>one</u>. Now I don't miss driving at all. I live in a city and I can walk to the shops or get a bus. The kids are used to walking and I am pleased they're fit. It annoys me seeing parents driving five minutes to school and blocking up the roads. We do the big supermarket shopping at the weekends as a family. I don't feel I've lost independence by not driving. It's much better to walk than be stuck waiting to be picked out by someone."
